**Course Description**

Allocation of resources and distribution of income as affected by the workings of the price system and by government policies. This course satisfies Section D “Social Sciences”.

**Course Learning Outcomes (CLOs)**

Upon successful completion of this course, students have concrete foundation to pursue intermediate study in microeconomic theory related to three broad areas: Incentives, Opportunity Cost, and Supply and Demand. Specific learning objectives include:

1. Incentives Matter (law of demand; law of supply; rational decision makers weight marginal costs versus marginal benefits; the power of self-interest)
2. Opportunity Costs (sunk costs; production possibilities; the free-lunch fallacy; tradeoffs in consumption and production; gains from interpersonal & international trade; comparative advantage)
3. Supply and Demand (understanding the S&D model as a representation of individual choices in exchange based on individual preferences, knowledge and circumstances; ability to examine current events using S&D tools; movement versus shift; welfare analysis)

## Course Requirements and Assignments

### *Macmillan Achieve Platform, Textbook, and Other Readings*

Students must sign up for the Macmillan Achieve platform for this course. This platform includes the e-textbook and hosts the homework and exams for this course. Students are expected to read the assigned material for that week before the first day of class for that week. For example, students should have read Cowen & Tabarrok Chapters 1-2 before class on August 27.

### *Participation*

As part of this class, students will participate in at least four economics games in class. Games will be announced in class and count towards the participation component of the grade. Students will also receive credit for participating in exam reviews and other class activities.

### *Achieve Assignments*

Homework is available under "Assignments" and graded on Macmillan Achieve. Assignments are due on Friday each week. The first assignments are due **August 30**. Students must complete all assignments in the Macmillan Achieve platform.

## ***Weekly Reflections***

As part of the Area D “Social Sciences” requirement, students must complete a writing assignment of 1,500 words over the course of the semester. In order to satisfy this requirement, students will complete weekly reflections on that week’s textbook readings. For example, students should write their reflection on Cowen & Tabarrok Chapters 1-2 before class on August 27. Reflections must be at least 150 words. Students will submit reflections in Canvas before class on Tuesday each week. ***Late work will not be accepted.*** Writing reflections on other topics, including other chapters from previous weeks, will also not be accepted. All students must also complete or retake the SJSU Plagiarism Tutorial & Quiz at <https://libguides.sjsu.edu/plagiarism> by the second week of the semester.

## ***Exams***

There will be four exams in this course, including the final exam. Students will take exams in the Macmillan Achieve platform. If a student must miss an exam, this should be discussed with me at least one week ahead of time. In the event of an emergency, students should email me immediately and provide documentation ASAP. Please note that if a student misses an exam and I have not accepted a student’s excuse, a grade of “0” will be given.
