Curriculum Design

Classes are small in order to foster an active learning environment that will encourage students to develop strong clinical reasoning and creative problem solving capabilities. Students refine skills in selecting, evaluating, and applying information in order to engage in evidence-based practice. Throughout the program, opportunities to interact with therapists and clients in clinical and community settings enable students to apply theoretical knowledge to practice.



SJSU Master's Program

- 4 semester academic program
 - Includes an International Experience
- 2 fieldwork placements (12 weeks each-40 hours/wk)
- MS degree conferred after final fieldwork placement
- Eligible to sit for national registration examination (www.NBCOT.org)
- SJSU OT programs have a high pass rate on registration exam

Cross-Cultural/International Experience

- The overall goal is to gain cross-cultural insight into the political, social cultural and economic factors that influence the provision of occupational therapy services outside of the US.
- Time abroad ranges from 1-3 weeks during the Winter or Summer session
- Students register for 1-6 units of coursework
- These courses fulfill requirements for the degree
- There are alternative options available if you cannot or do not want to travel



Fieldwork

• Following completion of the academic curriculum, students complete two 12-week, 40 hour per week fieldwork placements (OCTH 201A and OCTH 201B).

Admission Criteria

- GPA of 3.0 or better in last 60 semester or last 90 quarter units.
- Completion of prerequisite courses with a B or better prior to entry into the program.
- 80 hours volunteer experience verified by "Evaluation of Volunteer Experience" form. 60 hours under the direct supervision of an OT/L and 20 hours in a community agency.



Admission Criteria (continued)

GRE (Required for OTD only)

The following are preferred, but not required:

GRE Verbal score of 153 and an Analytic Writing score of 4.0 on the GRE is highly recommended

GRE scores, GPA for prerequisite courses and for the last 60 units of coursework, will be considered in applicant ranking

Admission Criteria (continued)

Submission of three letters of recommendation attesting to academic ability, work performance record and personal attributes necessary for graduate study. 1 letter must be from an academic source (professor)

*Remember: Letters of recommendation cannot be from someone who has completed the volunteer form



Minimum requirement for MSOT Application Submission

- Must complete at least 4 out of 8 of prerequisite courses with a B grade or better
- At least half of the volunteer hours must be completed at the time of application. Volunteer experience evaluation forms must be submitted. The person who completes the volunteer form cannot also submit a letter of recommendation
- Personal statement

All prerequisites and volunteer hours must be completed before the start of classes.

- Human Anatomy with human cadaver lab*
- Physiology with lab
- ◆ Neuroanatomy—Bio 109 @ SJSU is offered on campus Spring semester and OCTH 190 is offered online during the Summer
- General (Intro) Psychology
- Abnormal Psychology (Adult Psychopathology)
- Sociology OR Cultural Anthropology (General course)
- Statistics*
- Skills Course
- * = Must have been taken in last 7 years



Prerequisite Courses

All prerequisite courses can be taken at a community college except for the Neuroanatomy course. There is a list of acceptable courses to meet this required on our <u>website</u>

Applications are accepted once per year:

◆ MSOT: October 1st through February 1st

 Students are conditionally accepted on a rolling admission basis

The following are submitted via Cal State Apply (https://www2.calstate.edu/apply) MSOT program opens October 1st; OTD program opens August 1st Application to the University Official Transcripts

This is a separate process from your application to the program and to the University (GAPE)



Tips

- Investigate prerequisite courses at local colleges
- Begin the volunteer hours ASAP
- Start the application process early with OTCAS as it takes at least two weeks for them to verify your application.
- Applications are reviewed beginning October 1st for the MSOT Program. Admissions are on a rolling basis. Timing is important!
- Choose referees carefully for the LOR (1 academic source is required). Let the person writing you letter know what you are applying for and what you would like them to emphasize.
- Prepare a thoughtful personal statement describing goals and objectives for pursuing a Master's or Doctorate degree in OT, include leadership experiences and future potential/plans (on application form).
